OCTOBER SPEAKER:

PORWANCHER: PROBABILISTIC PASSION!

Our October 2022 Round Table – the nextto-last Zoom meeting, we hope – was opened by Dr. Joanne Grasso. Chairman David Jacobs had a conflict. When he was




able to join us, he and Dr. Grasso co-chaired the rest of the meeting. Eighteen attended.

Two new members introduced themselves. Barb is a New Jersey re-enactor. She has raised two kids as re-enactors. Her specialty is colonial era garments and fabrics. Bob Mohr is a battlefield docent at the Battle of Bennington site. He is writing a book to reply to a 2020 tome published by the Vermont Historical Society called THE

AND THE TORY: REBEL ETHAN ALLEN, PHILIP SKENE, AND THE DAWN OF VERMONT, by John J. Duffy, H. Nicholas Muller III, and Gary G. Shattuck. The Green Mountains were a disputed area on the eve of independence, between the provinces of New York and New Hampshire. The settlers mostly came from New Hampshire, while the landlords came from New York. The Duffy book sympathizes with New York, so Mr. Mohr is writing a pro-Hampshiremen counterargument. He says that the Province of New York was corrupt! Imagine that.

Our main speaker Professor was Andrew Porwancher, who teaches at the University of Oklahoma. His 2021 book THE JEWISH is WORLD OF ALEX-ANDER HAMIL-TON winner of the Book of the Year from award the



award from the American Revolution, and two other awards.

Dr. Porwancher had told us that he did not plan to give the usual PowerPoint presentation. We soon understood why. He had no use for maps and charts, as other authors would when giving a talk about a battle. His talk *was* a battle. It was an impassioned plea for his position on Hamilton's origins. He sounded to more than one of his listeners like Perry Mason thundering to the climax of a summation to a jury. No one fell asleep at this meeting!

But what exactly *was* his position? The key words in his presentation were "probably," "in all likelihood," and "probabilistic." Rachel Faucett Lavien Hamilton was not



born Jewish. Then for her son to be considered Jewish, Rachel must have converted when

she married Lavien, right? But Porwancher replies that he never *said* that Rachel had converted, only that she *probably* converted.

He singled out our member Stephen Weiner for debate. Stephen had reviewed Porwancher's book back in June for the Round Table.

Dr. Porwancher said that he is a professional historian. "What I write is probabilistic," he said. Unfortunately, readers and listeners never seem to hear you when you put qualifiers in your presentation. What the public gets is the idea that Porwancher has proven beyond the shadow of a doubt that Alexander Hamilton was raised Jewish. Or he thinks he has. Jonathan D. Sarna, the top authority on Jewish-American history, found Porwancher's convincing. book But convincing of what? That Hamilton was raised Jewish, or only that he may or may not have been raised Jewish?

(Sarna is the author of AMERICAN JUDAISM: A HISTORY, Yale U. Press, 2005. He teaches at Brandeis.)

Some more solid and less Schroedingeresque facts about Hamilton talk. out in the Porwancher came (pronounced POR-wahn-cher) went to Copenhagen and learned enough Danish to translate the relevant portions of some documents. Neither Johan Lavien nor any other Jew on St. Croix was identified in official documents as Jewish. But they were not identified as Christian either.

Peter Lavien, Alexander's half-brother, was not baptized at birth.

Ron Chernow writes that Alexander had a Jewish tutor, but he did not. He went to a Jewish school – and Jewish schools, as religious and not civil institutions, do not admit non-Jewish students.

Rachel was not buried in a Christian cemetery, but on a relative's estate. Historians quote other historians that a Christian clergyman officiated at Rachel's funeral, but there is absolutely no evidence for it. Porwancher warns that this is how widespread myths get started: historians quoting other historians and not taking the time to check the primary sources.

It is no surprise to Porwancher that historians have ignored Hamilton's probable Jewish origins for two hundred years. After all, they ignored Jefferson's concubinage of Sally Hemings for just as long. And speaking of TJ, someone has found a tiny fraction of Sephardic DNA in the third President. That puts him ahead of Hamilton if you are looking for Jewish blood. Hamilton was silent all his life about his origins, even to his own children.


General Washington deserves enormous credit for the famous Touro Synagogue letter. He was the first national leader in the history of the world to go on record championing Jewish civil rights.

Porwancher said that the Hamilton musical was great. He has written a historical defense of the musical. A rap battle in the Cabinet shows that this is just a musical and not a treatise on history, but Lin-Manuel Miranda was being a good historian in finding answers in Hamilton's childhood to the question of where he got some of his policies in adulthood.

167 pages and many pictures and maps. It gives a self-guided tour of the storied encampment. Vic finds it better for the casual reader than for the expert.

Under the Greenwalt book on the Amazon page is another tome called REVOLUTIONARY MONSTERS: FIVE MEN WHO TURNED LIBERATION INTO TYRANNY, by Donald T. Critchlow. It looked really interesting, but sadly, it turned about to be about Lenin, Mao, Castro, Mugabe and Khomeini, not about our Rev. I thought he might have found some dirt on Ethan Allen, who certainly had a cult of personality going in Vermont.

Keith Muchowski reviewed THE LAST KING OF AMERICA: THE MIS-UNDERSTOOD REIGN OF GEORGE III,



by Andrew Roberts, published by Viking in 2021. Keith finds this book to be a

great social and political history. Lynne asked Keith "If King George was so smart, how did he stumble into the Revolution and lose his thirteen American colonies? Keith replied that, according to Roberts, George had no choice. Parliament would not let him fail to go to war to keep his American subjects subjugated. So the debate still goes on, after two hundred years. Historians still have not reached consensus on whom to blame for the loss of the colonies, King George or Parliament.

Stacy Schiff was interviewed on the CBS Morning Show on October 15 about her new book, THE REVOLUTIONARY SAMUEL ADAMS (Little, Brown & Co., October 25, 2022). She said that the custom of calling him "Sam Adams" was started long after his lifetime by people trying to minimize his historical importance. So it's "Samuel" to you, if you please! He is more than just a brand of beer. Stacy Schiff is a professional writer and mainly a biographer. Her 2005 book A GREAT IMPROVISATION: FRANKLIN, FRANCE, AND THE BIRTH OF AMERICA, won the George Washington Book Prize.

Peter Feinman, of the Institute of History, Archaeology and Education, sent out an interesting review, on November 14, of NOAH'S CURSE: THE BIBLICAL JUSTIFICATION OF AMERICAN SLAVERY, by Stephen R. Haynes.



Lynne offered, for review, REBELS AT SEA: PRIVA-TEERING IN THE AMERI-

CAN REVOLUTION, by Eric Jay Dolan, published by Liveright in May, 2022. Later, two more books became available for LIBERTY IS SWEET: THE review: HIDDEN HISTORY OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, by Woody Holton, and THE SEWING GIRL'S TALE: A STORY OF CRIME AND CONSEQUENCES IN REVOLUTIONARY AMERICA, by John Wood Sweet. The first tells of the "ordinary and underrepresented members of society." The second deals with a true crime story in Revolutionary New York. The trial was said to have had a long-lasting effect on criminal law in the fledgling democracy.


British military historian Christopher Duffy has died. Born 1936. Taught at Sandhurst. Author of twenty books. Expert on 18th century European warfare. Not particularly the Rev War, but he wrote about the Prussians and Russians and Austrians, and about the Seven Years' War, of which our "French and Indian War" was one theater. So if you want to know where Baron de Steuben was coming from, Duffy could tell you about Steuben's old boss, Frederick the Great of Prussia. And you could learn something from Duffy about the uprising of Bonnie Prince Charlie in 1745. A lot of Scots fled to these shores as a result of losing that war. That loss helped put them and their sons in a revolutionary mood thirty years later.

Jack Buchanan will speak December 6 about his latest book, THE BATTLE OF MUSGROVE'S MILL, 1780. Out just a few days ago. His talk will be called "Picked Men Well Mounted." This was a case of



Rebel militia from the Carolinas and Georgia defending a ridge against twice their number of Lovalist militia and Provincial Regulars. This American victory was not a huge or battle. famous but if the Rebels had lost. it would

have discouraged the back-country independence movement and made it harder to gather sufficient troops for the soon-to-befought Battle of Kings Mountain, which proved the turning point in the Southern Campaign.

John Buchanan has been a Round Table and Board member for many years. He was the temporary Editor of this publication in the months following the death of Thomas Fleming in 2017. He is a native of Glens Falls, New York. He retired in 1993 from a career on the staff of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, where he became Chief Registrar and Archivist. He has written short stories and many books on the Rev War. The University of Virginia Press called Jack's THE ROAD TO GUILFORD COURTHOUSE "... one of the most acclaimed military histories of the Revolutionary War ever written."
